






RBC CONVENTION CENTRE FLOOR PLAN

Second Floor








5 - Skywalk to 2nd Floor Mezzanine in South Building

Nanette Eserio Administrative Assistant


Nanette's key responsibilities are to provide primary reception services, handle incoming and outgoing correspondence, event support and coordinate meetings between the AMM and stakeholders.



CHRIS MATHERS

Cyber Security - The Invisible War Monday, November 22

Imagine a world where every telephone call is monitored, every email and text message read. A world where all your most personal information can be stolen by cyber-criminals and offered for sale to the highest bidder. How much risk are you taking each time you turn on your computer, surf the Internet or participate in social media?

We are all bombarded every day with emails designed to trick you into downloading malware onto your computer or your

corporate network. Who are the people that are working so hard to steal your identity? What can you do to keep them in check?

How do we protect ourselves and our businesses from an invisible enemy? How much of your privacy will you be willing to give up for the sake of security? Convenience? Social Interaction? Where will be as a society in 25 years? What impact will the choices we make today have on privacy and security in the future. And how will our government protect us? Chris' insights into the world of organized crime and foreign intelligence and how the Internet is the new crime scene, will shock, inform, and entertain you.

Chris Mathers is a unique, humorous, and fascinating speaker. A popular media commentator and speaker, Mathers has served as a consultant on several feature films and documentaries re–lating to organized crime, espionage, and money laundering.

In his extraordinary talks, Chris Mathers takes audiences into the underworld that only he can describe, letting people in on the stunning stories and secrets harboured by terrorists and those involved in organized crime. In 1995, Mathers joined the Forensic division of the interna–tional accounting firm, KPMG. In 1999, he was appointed to the position of President of KPMG Corporate Intelligence Inc. where he was responsible for international due diligence, asset recovery operations, and the investigation and prevention of organized crime and money laundering.

Who's Driving the Grader? Monday, November 22

At a time when in Canada, and indeed around the world, national and provincial governments are being elected on populist platforms that are remarkably unencumbered by any vision that extends beyond next Tuesday, local governments in Canada still provide those essential services that people need and want.

Mayors and the rest of council's

Chris Goertzen was exposed to politics all his life—his father, Cornie, served on the council of the RM of La Broquerie for 30 years. After briefly leaving Manitoba to attend university in Montreal, Chris returned home to his roots and began a journey of community service that continues to thisday.

His political career began in 2002, when he was elected councillor for the City of Steinbach. Chris went on to run for Mayor in 2006, and would go on to serve as head of council for the next 12 years.

In 2010, Chris successfully ran for the position of Eastern Urban Director of the Association of Manitoba Municipalities. He went on to serve one term as Vice-President before being elected President of the AMM in 2015.

During his three years as President, Chris advocated regularly for AMM with the

In 2017, Chris had the honour of being elected Chair of the Provincial and Territorial Associations of the Federation of Canadian Municipalities. In this role he acted as Chief Spokesperson on behalf of all provincial and territorial associations across Canada as part of the Executive of Canadian Municipalities.

Since stepping down as President in 2018, Chris has remained busy attending to his business, popular Steinbach specialty grocery store/café Main Bread and Butter, which he started with his brother in 1997. He is also actively involved in several other local business ventures and continues to be participate in numerous local organizations and committees.

His most important role, however, is as a husband and father. Chris' wife Annalee Schellenberg and three children, Otto, Naomi and Frank are extremely proud of Chris' accomplishments, and happy to have him closer to home.

Chris is grateful to have had the opportunity to serve as President of the AMM, and of his role in helping to create strong, resilient communities throughout Manitoba.



RULES FOR RESOLUTION SESSIONS

Due to the ongoing pandemic and corresponding public health orders to reduce touch points, voting during the resolution's session will be conducted using the secure DOTS web portal on your own personal mobile device, computer or tablet.

- If voting members have any pressing issues that may arise, please visit Brandon at the DOTS booth to address any technical/voting questions.
- If you do not have a mobile device, computer or tablet, DOTS will provide temporary device loans in order to ensure eligible voting members are able to participate in the resolution session.
- 3. If your mobile device has a low battery, please visit the DOTS booth to receive a temporary battery package.
- Before the resolution session begins, please login to the DOTS web portal (https://amm.dotsconnect.live/vote.php?login=1) to enter your personal ID number and password.

CONVENTION DAY

- On Convention Day, the resolutions session will be moderated by a Chair assisted by a Parliamentarian as per previous years.
- 6. Members of the Resolutions Committee will read out the operative clauses of a given resolution i.e., the resolved portion.
- 7. The Chair will move the resolution.
- 8. The Chair will call for a seconder who will second the resolution by providing their name and municipality.
- 9. The seconder will open debate on the resolution. Then any municipal official is welcome to speak in favour or opposition to the resolution at hand; microphones will be labelled specifically for those "in favour" and "opposed".
- 10. Anyone speaking to a resolution will have a maximum of <u>two minutes</u>. The time remaining for speakers will be displayed, counting from two minutes to zero, at which time microphones will be turned off.
 - a. For those participating virtually, anyone wishing to speak to a resolution will be asked to raise their virtual hand. Your microphone will be turned on when called on by the Chair.
- 11. As provided for in Robert's Rules of Order, the Chair will call for speakers alternately from each microphone position. If no speakers with an alternate position request the floor, the Chair may, after entertaining three or more speakers to the one position, end debate even if further speakers to the position have already requested the floor.
- 12. No one may speak twice per resolution unless for clarification.
- 13. The seconder will be invited to close debate.

RULES FOR RESOLUTION SESSIONS

- 14. Once the Chair calls the question, the resolution in the secure DOTS web portal (https://amm.dotsconnect.live/vote.php?login=1) will become active and eligible voters will be able to cast their votes using their mobile device, computer or tablet.
- 15. Each resolution will appear under the "Current Resolutions" tab. Once the resolution has become active, please click on the "Next Vote" button at the top of the page to cast your vote.
- 16. Following this step, you will see the "THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED" clause on your screen. You must click the "vote now" button followed by "in favour" or "opposed" at the bottom of the page.
- Once you have selected your option you must hit the "confirm" button to cast your vote.
- 18. All eligible voting members will have 30 seconds to submit their vote.

AMENDMENTS

- 19. Amendments to motions may be introduced by any registered voting delegate. Unlike the "Standing Order" for main motions, the Chair will not move an amendment.
- 20. Once the motion to amend has been introduced, the Chair will decide if the amendment is in order (i.e., does not change the intent of the motion).
- 21. If the Chair decides the motion is in order, they will call for a seconder.
- 22. Once the amendment has been moved and seconded, the motion to amend will be dealt with in the same way as all motions as outlined in the Standing Orders and Rules of Order.
- 23. Unlike main motions, however, amendments to the amendment will not be accepted.
- 24. Discussion on an amendment must address the amendment only and not the merits of the main motion.
- 25. The Chair will entertain only two amendments per resolution.
- 26. If the Chair decides the motion is in order, voting members will be able to use the secure DOTS web portal to cast their votes on the amendment.
- 27. If the amendment is passed, the remainder of the debate follows the normal resolution process.

VOTING RESULTS

- 28. Eligible voters (in-person or virtual) will be able to cast their votes using the secure DOTS web portal on your <u>mobile device</u>, <u>computer or tablet</u>.
- 29. The results will be displayed and read aloud immediately following the end of each resolution.

RESOLUTION CATEGORIES

RESOLUTION CATEGORIES

The following categories shall apply to all resolutions submitted for consideration by the Association of Manitoba Municipalities at either the Annual Convention or the District Meetings.

CATEGORY 1: MUNICIPAL ISSUES

Category 1 resolutions are resolutions whose outcome has the potential to impact a majority of municipalities.

It is possible that the outcome of a Category 1 resolution might not immediately impact all municipalities, but the outcome has the potential to impact a majority of municipalities. This impact may be direct or indirect.

Examples of areas of influence of Category 1 resolutions include direct changes to legislation that govern municipalities, such as *The Municipal Act*, or more indirect changes to government programs that might impact municipalities, like a change in the provincial drainage program.

Category 1 resolutions, if passed at the District Meetings, will be brought forward to the main Resolutions Committee for consideration at the Annual Convention.

CATEGORY 2: LOCAL OR REGIONAL MUNICIPAL ISSUES

Category 2 resolutions deal with local or regional issues that affect one region or only a small number of municipal governments.

An example of a Category 2 resolution would be a resolution dealing with a necessary improvement to a specific local road.

Resolutions in this grouping will be presented at the District Meetings; however, they will not be submitted for consideration at the annual Convention. A resolution in this category, if passed at the District Meeting, will be dealt with by the Board of Directors as they see fit.

CATEGORY 3: NON-MUNICIPAL ISSUES

Non-municipal issues do not affect municipal governments.

Resolutions in this grouping will not be presented at the District Meetings or the Annual Convention; instead, they will be dealt with by the Board of Directors as they see fit.

Increased Funding for Handi-Van Operations

WHEREAS Handi-Van/Handi-Transit transportation programs are offered in communities to elderly and mobility-challenged residents to provide them a safe and reliable mode of transportation to assist in their independence and allow them to continue to be active in their communities; and

WHEREAS the Province helps to financially support Handi-Van/Handi-Transit programs through the Mobility Disadvantaged Transportation Program (MDTP), the funding levels of which have remained unchanged since 2004; and

WHEREAS Handi-Van/Handi-Transit organizations try to keep their user fees of their services as low as possible to make them affordable for their clients, but are struggling due to the lack of increased MDTP grant funding;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT the AMM lobby the Province of Manitoba to review and revise the Mobility Disadvantaged Transportation Program to index funding to inflation, thereby ensuring the viability and sustainability of this transportation option for the elderly and mobility-challenged.

AMM Resolution #02-2021

WHEREAS the method by which municipalities are being engaged regarding infrastructure development within their municipality has significantly evolved over the past 25 years since the passing of the current *Municipal Act*; and

WHEREAS there is a need for greater flexibility in legislation for municipalities to be able to consider all types of financial instruments, not just borrowing or reserve expenditures in order to be able to support or fund infrastructure investment within its boundaries including loan guarantees; and

WHEREAS a municipality can loan money as per Section 180 of *The Municipal Act*, borrow money as per Section 172 of *The Municipal Act*, and grant money as per Sections 258 and 261 of *The Municipal Act*; and

WHEREAS the City of Winnipeg Charter allows Winnipeg to provide loan guarantees under certain conditions; and

WHEREAS *The Municipal Act* is silent in terms of providing authority to municipalities outside of Winnipeg with the ability to provide loan guarantees;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT the AMM lobby the Province of Manitoba to amend The Municipal Act to provide municipal governments throughout Manitoba the ability to grant loan guarantees for capital projects.

AMM Resolution #03-2021

Duties of the Head of Council

Sponsor(s)

Department(s)

Lac du Bonnet, Town (Eastern)

Manitoba Municipal Relations

WHEREAS *The Municipal Act* is legislation enacted by the Province of Manitoba respecting the operations of Rural municipalities, Cities, Towns and Villages in Manitoba; and

WHEREAS there are conflicting sections in The Municipal Act that need clarification, for example:

Sec. 83(2) Duties of the head of council

In addition to performing the duties of a member of a council, the head of council has a duty

- (a) to preside when in attendance at a council meeting, except where the procedures by-law or this or any other Act otherwise provides;
- (b) to provide leadership and direction to the council; and
- (c) to perform any other duty or function assigned to a head of council by the council or by this or any other Act.

Sec. 107(2) Head of council is member of all committees

The head of council is a member of all council committees referred to in subsection (1) unless the council expressly provides otherwise in its organizational by-law.

Sec. 149(3) Content of procedures by-law

The council must in its procedures by-law provide for

- (a) regular meetings of the council, and the day, time and place of the meetings;
- (b) the type and amount of notice to be given of regular meetings of the council;
- (c) the procedure to be followed and the type and amount of notice to be given to change the day, time or place of a regular meeting of the council;
- (d) rules respecting the conduct of council meetings;
- (e) rules respecting public participation at council meetings;
- (f) a procedure for the appointment of a member to act as head of council if the head and deputy head are unable to act or the offices are vacant;
- (g) the type and amount of notice to be given of a special meeting of the council; and
- (h) the time within which a special meeting of the council requested under clause 151(1)(b) must be called by the head of council and must take place

WHEREAS due to different interpretations of the above sections relating to Duties of Head of Council has led to the passing of Organizational and Procedures By-Laws where the Head of Council can only act under the direction of majority of Council members thereby affecting the democratic rights of ratepayers; and

WHEREAS these by-laws have eliminated the need for a Head of Council ballot;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT the AMM lobby the Province of Manitoba to immediately amend *The Municipal Act* under the above sections to provide clear definition as to duties of Heads of Council and remove the words "except where the procedures or organizational by-law provides otherwise" in order to restore democracy; and

FURTHER BE IT RESOLVED THAT the Province review all standardized procedures and organizational by-laws.

WHEREAS municipal property taxes are levied to pay for municipal services provided to properties within the municipality; and

WHEREAS of the taxes paid by the individual properties, all properties receive basically the same services; and

WHEREAS the current municipal tax levy calculation is based on the ad-valorum system of assessment times mill rate and thus the higher assessed a property is, the higher the taxes are in comparison to lower assessed properties; and

WHEREAS this calculation of taxes is a deterrent to property owners developing, improving, and maintaining their properties, yet the wealth of an individual is not reflected by the assessment of their property and thus taxes they are levied;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT the AMM lobby the Province of Manitoba to amend and enact legislation to provide various tax tools that municipalities may use to mitigate the huge tax variances that are occurring as a result of assessment relevant to the services provided. These may include but are not limited to:

- Base tax
- Minimum tax
- Varied mill rate to the various property tax classes; and

FURTHER BE IT RESOLVED THAT the AMM lobby the Province of Manitoba to direct the Assessment Branch to do a physical re-assessment review on a four (4) year rotation and apply the market desktop analysis simultaneously rather than relying on permits applied for or alternatively allow individual municipalities to hire assessors to provide the information to the assessment branch.

WHEREAS local property taxes promote local autonomy and accountability owing to the connection between many of the services provided at the local level; and

WHEREAS the current tax tools available to Manitoba municipalities do not adequately address the issues related to equitable distribution of tax burden; and

WHEREAS the Provinces of Quebec, Ontario, Saskatchewan, Alberta, British Columbia, Northwest Territories and Yukon and City of Winnipeg, all have variable or differential tax rates for different property types (residential, commercial, industrial, farm, etc.); and

WHEREAS the Province of Saskatchewan also has the ability to impose a minimum, or base tax plus mill rate to all property classes; and

WHEREAS these types of tax tools would allow Manitoba municipalities to more equitably distribute the burden of taxes in relation to services received;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT the AMM lobby the Province of Manitoba to conduct a complete property tax reform study and take into consideration how these types of tax tools available in the majority of other provinces across our country can benefit Manitoba municipalities and allow for flexibility at the local level and put the policy decision of determining the distribution of the municipal tax burden among the property classes in the hands of municipalities.

WHEREAS the funding allocation for grants from provincial and federal governments are allocated on a per capita basis using census population; and

WHEREAS the cost to provide municipal services to seasonal or nonpermanent residents is just as high and, in some cases, higher than permanent residents; and

WHEREAS using dwelling units as the basis for these allocations would be more equitable; and

WHEREAS dwelling unit data is more accurate, timelier and readily available;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT the AMM lobby the Province of Manitoba to change their policy on the allocation of all basket funding such that dwelling units are used as the basis for allocation; and

FURTHER BE IT RESOLVED THAT the AMM requests that the *Gas Tax Agreement* with the federal government which will be renewed in 2024 be amended to reflect an allocation base using dwelling units as the basis for distribution to municipalities.

WHEREAS the College of Paramedics of Manitoba (CPMB) has been newly established as a means of self regulation to serve and protect the public interest, having received approval by the Lieutenant Governor in Council in 2020; and

WHEREAS the CPMB requires of its members to have professional liability insurance in the amount of 5 million dollars to protect the public interest, regardless of whether paramedic care is received as part of services provided for by a regional health authority, contracted agency, service license holder, private company or volunteer role; and

WHEREAS the CPMB also requires of all paramedic professionals including all licensed technicians practicing in Manitoba, to pay a significant annual registration fee in addition to holding a certificate of professional liability insurance in the amount of 5 million dollars; and

WHEREAS CPMB will not recognize municipal liability insurance extended to employees as the requirements for professional liability insurance and requires that registration fees and other payments be submitted directly from licensed individuals rather than from municipalities; and

WHEREAS the CPMB requirement that all Medical First Responders (MFR) be registered with the College has significant cost implications for municipalities, who augment their emergency response services with volunteer MFR services through their volunteer fire departments; and

WHEREAS the requirement for licensed individuals to submit membership fees rather than from their respective municipality will create additional administrative cost and complexity to reimburse each individual volunteer MFR;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT the AMM lobby the Province of Manitoba and the College of Paramedics of Manitoba to establish a secondary membership classification system for voluntary Medical First Responders with a corresponding membership fee that recognizes that this category of paramedic as a voluntary or 'part-time' group; and

FURTHER BE IT RESOLVED THAT the AMM lobby the Province of Manitoba and the CPMB to accept the AMM Municipal Insurance program and its liability coverages as sufficient coverages for the voluntary Medical First Responders; and

FURTHER BE IT RESOLVED THAT the AMM lobby the CPMB to amend their invoicing practice to allow municipalities to pay memberships on behalf of their Medical First Responders.

Dedicated Stretcher Service

WHEREAS a common practice in rural health care facilities involved the use of ambulances for non-urgent inter-facility transfers, taking away essential resources from its intended purpose, negatively impacting ambulance response times;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT the AMM lobby the Province of Manitoba to implement a dedicated stretcher service for non-urgent inter-facility transfers in rural Manitoba in an effort to improve ambulance response times.

WHEREAS not all medical professionals qualified for any COVID-19 financial incentives; and

WHEREAS many of the rural areas are seeing more and more medical professionals leave for bigger cities citing salary brackets and taxes being a major factor causing rural areas to temporarily and sometimes permanently close their facilities;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT the AMM lobby the provincial and federal governments to enhance retention by offering better incentives to medical professionals to work and stay in rural areas (e.g., tax incentives such as tax free with condition medical professional to stay in rural areas for X number of years).

WHEREAS to continue operation of these waste disposal cells, an engineer is required to design and oversee construction/modifications to the existing cells and all future cells, and

WHEREAS the implementation of the new amendments will create a financial hardship to municipalities;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT the AMM lobby the Province of Manitoba to provide funding to municipalities for the completion of the required design, and construction/modifications of the waste disposal cells.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT the AMM lobby the Province of Manitoba to create separate fee schedules depending on the provider class:

- Municipality
- Commercial
- Residential; and

FURTHER BE IT RESOLVED THAT the AMM lobby the Province of Manitoba to further breakdown the fee levels by essential service buildings.

Streamline Manitoba Hydro Requests

WHEREAS Section 5.6 of the Whitemouth Reynolds Planning District Development Plan clearly references Water Quality and Shoreland;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT the AMM lobby the Province of Manitoba and Manitoba Hydro to develop a streamlined process by providing input in a timely manner.

RCMP Unionization Costs

WHEREAS the Royal Canadian Mounted Police provide public safety services through contracts with the Province of Manitoba or directly with Manitoba municipalities; and

WHEREAS municipalities are responsible for a large share of policing and public safety costs, which represent significant portions of municipal budgets; and

WHEREAS the RCMP has recently unionized and completed collective bargaining with the Government of Canada, which will result in increased costs to municipalities; and

WHEREAS municipalities have no say or control in collective bargaining negotiations for RCMP services, nor the ability to control associated costs; and

WHEREAS Canada advised municipalities to budget 2.5% per year in anticipated costs associated with unionization retroactive to 2016, and Manitoba municipalities have budgeted accordingly; and

WHEREAS the actual cost increases negotiated through collective bargaining are well in excess of 2.5% retroactive to 2016, beyond amounts budgeted for by municipalities;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT the AMM lobby the Province of Manitoba and Government of Canada to provide financial assistance to Manitoba municipalities to offset the unexpected rise in policing costs associated with RCMP unionization.

Prairie Farm Rehabilitation Administration (PFRA)

WHEREAS the current drought being experienced in Manitoba is reaching a severity not seen since selected years in the 1980s and 1930s; and

WHEREAS grain and livestock production form the tax base in many rural municipalities; and

WHEREAS drought impacts grain and livestock production negatively, as well as the strain water scarcity places on the mental, physical and economic wellbeing of residents; and

WHEREAS the Prairie Farm Rehabilitation Administration (PFRA) was credited with much success providing solutions for availability of water across Western Canada, for example, PFRA is responsible for 70,000 dugouts across the prairies and innumerable municipal wells; and

WHEREAS municipalities were the beneficiaries of PFRA well drilling programs, the drought has made it necessary for many municipalities to drill new wells; and

WHEREAS the Government of Manitoba has developed temporary programs, such as the emergency program in 2021 responding to producers with water access issues, and these programs were widely used by producers; there was no measure to assist municipalities; and

WHEREAS temporary measures provide relief, they rarely accomplish long lasting mitigation measures that are required to address water shortages; and

WHEREAS PFRA's dissolution began in 2009, and since that time the federal government continues to transfer monies that previously funded soil, water, shelterbelt and pasture programs, to provinces through the Canadian Agricultural Partnership Agreement;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT the AMM lobby the Province of Manitoba to create a permanent program to provide services once provided by PFRA; and

FURTHER BE IT RESOLVED THAT the AMM lobby the Government of Canada for re-instatement of PFRA or the creation of a permanent program based on PFRA's principles, organized to prevent and mitigate drought in the unique area that makes up the Western Canadian Prairies.

Explanatory Note:

Given the severe drought situation across Manitoba this year, this resolution was presented to the AMM Board on August 27, 2021. The Board decided to send this resolution to the Department of Agriculture and Resource Development for a formal written response to address municipal concerns promptly. This resolution is not to be voted on and is included for informational purposes only.
