# ✓ Provincial-Municipal Partnership

## Department of Municipal Relations

- The AMM acknowledges the significant steps taken by the provincial government to fulfill the 'fair say' commitment; and
- The AMM is very pleased to participate as a member of the local consultative committee that reviews applications for the Building Canada Small Communities Fund.

- Commit to provide a full-and-fair cost share by matching the federal government's contribution (40%) for Phase 11 infrastructure investments under the Investing in Canada plan;
- Ensure municipalities receive a fair share of available cost-shared infrastructure funding, particularly under the Green Infrastructure stream, in consultation with the AMM;
- Continue to partner with municipalities to repair and replace roads and bridges in local communities by investing no less than \$1 billion annually in strategic infrastructure; and
- Support AMM input in the decision-making process for any applicationbased infrastructure funding.



# ✓ Basket Funding and 'Single-Window' Access for Infrastructure Grants

## Department of Municipal Relations

The AMM welcomes the government's rollout of the basket funding model and single-window intake for infrastructure grants in close consultation with our organization and municipalities.

### The AMM recommends the government:

Continue to provide municipalities a 'fair say' to more effectively respond to local infrastructure priorities.

## **✓** Red Tape Reduction

## Department of Municipal Relations

- The AMM welcomes the government's commitment to streamline internal processes and reduce red tape to help municipalities more efficiently access infrastructure grant funding and deliver public services; and
- The AMM was pleased to submit a comprehensive report to the Red Tape Reduction Task Force with 20 targeted recommendations in March 2017.

- Implement the AMM's red tape reduction recommendations; and
- \* Continue to identify unnecessary red tape and streamline provincial government processes to benefit Manitoba municipalities.



## ✓ The Mental Health Amendment Act

- Department of Justice
- Department of Health, Seniors and Active Living

The AMM recommends the government:

Continue to consult with the AMM and municipalities when establishing the corresponding training program for 'qualified persons' to ensure effective implementation in local communities.

# **✓** Municipal By-Law Enforcement

- Department of Justice
- Department of Municipal Relations

The AMM recommends the government:

- Continue to provide support to municipalities in order to implement the new by-law enforcement process; and
- Help cover training costs for municipal officials to ensure the effective administration of municipal by-law enforcement.

# ✓ Subdivision Approval Technical Advisory Committee

Department of Municipal Relations

The AMM recommends the government:

Continue to implement the TAC report's recommendations and work towards streamlining other aspects of the subdivision review process identified by the AMM.



## **CRITICAL ISSUES - IMMEDIATE ACTION REQUIRED**

# ✓ Fair Share, Alternate Revenues, and Timing of Provincial Initiatives

### Department of Finance

- Municipalities rely on property taxes to generate revenues while receiving less than 10 cents on every tax dollar; and
- The freezing of municipal operating funding at 2016 levels does not recognize inflationary increases, while provincial initiatives and program funding decisions affecting municipalities are often announced following the municipal budgetary process.

### The AMM recommends the government:

- Increase funding support to municipalities through long-term, stable and predictable revenue sources that grow with the economy;
- Identify new, additional sources of revenue for municipalities to address Manitoba's growing \$11 billion infrastructure deficit and increasing municipal responsibilities; and
- Inform municipalities of provincial initiatives and program funding changes prior to the development and submission of municipal budgets.

# **✓** PST Rebate for Municipalities

### Department of Finance

Each year, municipalities pay more than \$25 million in PST to the provincial government.

### The AMM recommends the government:

Eliminate or rebate the more than \$25 million in PST paid on an annual basis by municipalities.



# ✓ Modernize Education Funding

Department of Education and Training

The AMM recommends the government:

- Establish a multi-stakeholder Task Force to comprehensively review and modernize Manitoba's education funding model;
- Provide new, sustainable long-term funding to reduce school division reliance on property taxes; and
- Rescind the \$5,000 cap on the Farmland School Tax Rebate.

## **✓** Essential Cell Service and Broadband Internet Access

Department of Growth, Enterprise and Trade

- Facilitate discussions with cell carriers and other stakeholders to explore options to expand cellular coverage and broadband Internet access; and
- Work with municipalities to develop solutions to ensure the safety of emergency responders and the public in Manitoba through reliable communications technology.



# ✓ Federal DFAA Changes and Provincial DFA Review

### Department of Infrastructure

Due to recent changes, federal funding thresholds for small and medium disasters or extreme weather events have been significantly increased, which jeopardizes the safety of all Manitobans. These changes represent a download of federal responsibilities to provincial governments, resulting in additional pressures on municipalities.

## The AMM recommends the government:

- Support municipalities by urging the federal government to immediately reverse changes to the Disaster Financial Assistance Arrangements (DFAA) cost-sharing formula that took effect in February 2015; and
- Continue to consult with the AMM on the provincial review of the disaster financial assistance program.

# ✓ Accessibility Legislation and Standards

### Department of Families

\* The AMM is a member of Manitoba's Accessibility Advisory Council.

- Ensure the Accessibility Advisory Council remains the primary forum for developing the corresponding standards in accordance with The Accessibility for Manitobans Act (AMA);
- \* Recognize the unique needs of municipalities by providing funding to help identify, prevent, and remove barriers to accessibility within local communities: and
- Significantly reduce the administrative and financial burdens on municipalities due to AMA compliance.



# ✓ Port of Churchill and Northern Manitoba Economic Development

Department of Growth, Enterprise and Trade

The AMM recommends the government:

- Provide assistance to the Town of Churchill and surrounding communities in light of the reduction of the Port of Churchill's operations and subsequent rail disruption; and
- Expedite the development of both a short-term plan and long-term strategy to support economic growth, job creation, and sustainable development throughout Northern Manitoba in partnership with municipal officials and other community stakeholders.

# ✓ Police Staffing and Funding

Department of Justice

- Effectively address rapidly increasing, unsustainable policing costs;
- Help ensure Manitoba communities are not negatively impacted by the right of RCMP officers to collective bargaining;
- Consult with the AMM in regard to the Strategic Operational Review of the RCMP; and
- Continue working with municipalities wishing to establish Community Safety Officer (CSO) Programs.



# ✓ Drainage Licensing and Approvals

Department of Sustainable Development

The AMM recommends the government:

- \* Reduce provincial red tape to expedite drainage licensing approvals; and
- Ensure consistent enforcement by local Water Resource Officers.

# ✓ Provincial Planning and Assessment Services Staff

Department of Municipal Relations

The AMM recommends the government:

Immediately fill any vacancies in regional planning and assessment offices to ensure municipalities are receiving timely and accurate services from each of these branches.

## ✓ Cosmetic Pesticide Ban

- Department of Sustainable Development
- The AMM welcomes the Province of Manitoba's willingness to comprehensively review the Non-Essential Pesticide Use Regulation.

- Recognize and address the financial impacts of the current ban on municipal weed control efforts and municipal budgets; and
- Considering implementing measures to ensure the safe use of cosmetic pesticides without banning them, such as public education or restricting access to licensed applicators.



# **✓** Community Capital Contributions for Health Facilities

Department of Health, Seniors and Active Living

The AMM recommends the government:

Reduce required community capital contributions for health facilities while moving toward funding all health facilities provincially.

# ✓ Cannabis Legalization and Regulation

- Department of Crown Services
- Department of Municipal Relations

The AMM recommends the government:

- Ensure municipalities are closely consulted and engaged throughout the development and implementation of a cannabis legalization framework;
- Provide tools and resources to municipalities in order to proactively prepare communities prior to and following the transition to legalization; and
- Co-develop a fair revenue sharing model that respects municipal authority and recognizes rising policing costs.

# **✓** Municipal Police Boards

Department of Justice

The AMM recommends the government:

Review the mandate of police boards to allow local Councils more oversight over municipal police forces, including the establishment of police boards on a voluntary basis.



# ✓ Manitoba Hydro Rate Increases and Support for Recreation Facilities

Department of Crown Services

- \* Recognize the negative effects on municipalities caused by significant Manitoba Hydro rate increases; and
- Support and increase funding to financial incentive programs that promote and encourage greater efficiency of recreation centres throughout Manitoba.

# ✓ Health Practitioner Recruitment and Retention

- Department of Health, Seniors and Active Living
- Local communities continue to struggle to attract and retain health practitioners.

### The AMM recommends the government:

Fully implement the forthcoming recommendations Rural Physician Recruitment Advisory Committee to ensure all Manitobans have access to suitable primary care.

# ✓ Rural Economic Development Strategy

- Department of Growth, Enterprise and Trade
- With 37% of Manitoba's population and more than 12,000 businesses, rural Manitoba is vital to the provincial economy.

## The AMM recommends the government:

❖ Fully implement all the recommendations of the Rural Economic Development Strategy report, including providing 'single-window' services to rural Manitoba.



# **✓** Amalgamation Costs

## Department of Municipal Relations

The AMM appreciates the department's willingness to cooperate with the AMM and the Manitoba Municipal Administrators Association (MMAA) to address challenges faced by amalgamated municipalities.

## The AMM recommends the government:

Continue to support local communities by covering the costs resulting from municipal amalgamations, including but not limited to upgrades or conversions to municipal offices as well as administrative and financial services.

### **✓** Made-in-Manitoba Climate and Green Plan

Department of Sustainable Development

- Closely consult with the AMM and municipalities on the implementation of the Made-in-Manitoba Climate and Green Plan;
- Ensure municipal representation on the Expert Advisory Commission and other municipally-relevant committees; and
- Partner with municipalities to invest carbon pricing revenues in municipal climate-resilient infrastructure.



# **✓** Flood Mitigation, Water Management and Conservation Districts

## Department of Sustainable Development

The AMM believes there is significant value in increased provincial funding for Conservation Districts due to the effectiveness of their water management plans and cost-effective watershed management initiatives.

### The AMM recommends the government:

- Continue to allocate funding for flood prevention and mitigation infrastructure;
- Implement a province-wide program based on the Alternative Land Use Services (ALUS) model to help reduce flooding and improve water management;
- Consult with municipalities on watershed-based planning and drainage initiatives;
- Continue funding the collection of LiDAR data; and
- Increase operating funding for the Conservation District Program and consider reevaluating the funding formula.

# ✓ Affordable and Seniors' Housing

Department of Families

### The AMM recommends the government:

❖ Continue to consult with the AMM and help facilitate partnerships between municipalities, the federal government, and private sector to increase the stock of affordable and seniors' housing across Manitoba.



# **✓** Community Development Programs and AMM Involvement

## Department of Municipal Relations

The AMM recommends the government:

- Reinstate and increase funding to the Community Places Program; and
- Involve the AMM in the decision-making process that approves project through the new single portal for community development programs.

# ✓ Manitoba Tourism Strategy

Department of Growth, Enterprise and Trade

The AMM recommends the government:

- Continue to investment in the tourism sector across Manitoba while creating stronger links with local community museums; and
- Consult with the AMM on the development of a Manitoba Tourism Strategy.

## ✓ Handi-Transit Services

Department of Municipal Relations

- Support regional and community-sponsored options for local Handitransit services; and
- Support affordable and sustainable transit services for all residents, including those who must travel for medical reasons, and those with mobility issues.



# **✓** Dutch Elm Disease Management

## Department of Sustainable Development

The current level of provincial financial assistance is insufficient as communities regularly incur costs of up to \$1,000 per diseased elm tree.

### The AMM recommends the government:

Continue to implement program changes in consultation with the AMM.

### ✓ Hometown Green Teams

Department of Education and Training

The AMM recommends the government:

Continue to support this successful program, which gives students valuable experience and benefits local communities.

# ✓ Rural Veterinary Funding

Department of Agriculture

- Reinstate the Technical Enhancement Grant to assist Veterinary Service Districts with increasing equipment costs; and
- Increase funding for operating costs to keep rural veterinarian salaries competitive and to enable rural clinics to continue providing veterinary services to their communities.



# **✓** Rural, Remote and Northern Airports

## Department of Infrastructure

The AMM recommends the government:

- Reinstate a capital assistance program for airports on a 50-50 basis with municipalities; and
- Increase the amount of operating grants for rural paved and unpaved airports, which have remained at \$2,400 and \$1,200 respectively, for at least ten years.

# ✓ Library Funding and Universal Access

Department of Sport, Culture and Heritage

The AMM recommends the government:

- Increase provincial funding to the Rural Library Operating Grant Program; and
- Allow all library cards issued in Manitoba to be valid at any library that receives provincial funding.

# ✓ Canada-Manitoba Job Grant Funding

Department of Education and Training

The AMM recommends the government:

Reach an agreement with the federal government to include municipalities as eligible applicants for the Canada-Manitoba Job Grant.



# ✓ Treaty Land Entitlement (TLE) Support

- Department of Municipal Relations
- o Department of Indigenous and Northern Relations

The AMM recommends the government:

Continue to provide financial and consultative support to assist municipalities in developing service sharing agreements with First Nations communities as well as throughout the Treaty Land Entitlement process.
