- 2,100 member municipalities in every part of Canada
- Nearly 80% are rural, remote and northern communities
- Our members represent more than
 92% of Canadians

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FCM delivers results

- ✓ Canada's first National Adaptation Strategy
 - √ 530 million invested in Green Municipal Fund (GMF) for climate adaptation and resilient infrastructure projects
- ✓ Two-time doubling of the Canada Community-Building Fund:

 Direct, predictable infrastructure funding for municipalities of all sizes (budgets 2019 and 2021)
- \$4.3 billion in federal emergency operating support for all municipalities during COVID.

- ✓ Canada's first-ever National Housing Strategy
 - ✓ Rapid Housing Initiative
 - ✓ Housing Accelerator Fund
 - ✓ Urban, Rural and Remote Indigenous Housing Strategy





For a municipal growth framework

Canada is growing. We need a modernized <u>municipal growth</u> <u>framework</u> to provide municipalities with <u>predictable sources of revenue</u> that increase alongside population and economic growth, enabling communities to prosper.

- ✓ Local governments receive less than 10 cents of every tax dollar collected, while having to maintain more than 60% of public infrastructure.
- ✓ Communities need to be empowered to address new challenges like housing, climate change, mental health, and the vital local services Canadians depend on.


Municipal Finance 101

Balanced municipal budgets

- Balanced budgets and reserves do not mean "Everything is OK"
- Municipalities are generally required to balance annual operating budgets.
- Municipal budgets are generally a statement of "what will be done" and not necessarily an indication of "what needs to be done."


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The Local Piece of the Pie in Canada vs. Manitoba




Local government share of consolidated government tax revenue, 1990 to 2021

Federal/Provincial vs. Municipal Tax Changes



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
Evaluating SolutionsA workable solution must be sensitive to these four categories of attributes:




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A modern relationship



Helps municipalities create, launch and expand innovative financing programs for home energy projects.

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Sustainable Affordable Housing (SAH)

Offers support to local affordable housing providers – including municipal, not-for-profit organizations and housing co-ops – to retrofit existing affordable housing units, or construct energy efficient new builds that emit lower GHG emissions.

Community Buildings Retrofit (CBR)

Helps municipalities optimize the energy performance of community buildings and reduce GHG emissions.










This initiative is offered through the Municipal Asset Management Program, which is delivered by the Federation of Canadian Municipalities and funded by the Government of Canada.
